INFORMATION FOR VOTERS

NOTICE TO VOTERS – CALIFORNIA ELECTIONS CODE, SECTION 13312

Pursuant to CA Elections Code, Section 13312, this notice is to inform voters that the county voter information guide does not contain a complete list of candidates and that a complete list of candidates appears on the sample ballot.

Each candidate's statement in the county voter information guide is volunteered by the candidate and is printed at his or her expense.

CHECK YOUR REGISTRATION: If you have interacted with the DMV, your voter registration information may have been inadvertently changed. It is important to confirm your voter status, political party affiliation, and other information to make sure you are still registered correctly. Check your status at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov.

★ **DAMAGED BALLOTS:** If you incorrectly mark, tear or spoil any portion of your ballot, a replacement ballot can be issued. Please contact the Placer County Elections Office for instructions – you can find our contact information on the front cover of this guide.

★ **LOST THE BALLOT MAILED TO YOU:** If you lose, misplace or discard your ballot that was mailed to you, you may request a replacement ballot be sent to you or vote a ballot in person at the Elections Office in Auburn beginning October 10. Contact the Elections Office for directions – you can find our contact information on the front cover of this guide.

★ **VOTING BY MAIL:** Postage is not necessary when returning your ballot. After you have completed voting, review your choices one final time to be sure they are correct and place your ballot in the return envelope provided. Be sure to **sign and date** the envelope where required. The envelope must have your signature on it, or the ballot cannot be counted. Return the envelope according to the instructions you receive with your ballot. If you wish to return your voted ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day, November 8, and received by the Elections Office no later than Tuesday, November 15 for your ballot to count. We encourage you to mail your ballot early so it will arrive on time. If you wish to return your voted ballot in person, it must be hand-delivered at or before 8 PM on Election Day. For your convenience, we have various types of ballot drop-off locations in the county, including 24-hour boxes. For additional information on drop box hours and locations in Placer County, see page “DROP.”

★ **VOTING AT YOUR POLLING PLACE:** If you would prefer to vote at your polling place instead of by mail, bring your ballot and envelope with you to avoid the potential of voting a provisional ballot. After you have completed voting your poll ballot, look over your choices one final time to be sure they are correct, place your ballot in the secrecy sleeve, and deposit the ballot into the ballot scanner. **Please note – your polling place may have changed. Check the back cover of this guide for your polling place.**

★ **OPTIONS FOR RECEIVING YOUR VOTER INFORMATION GUIDE:** State law (AB 1717, established in 2010) allows voters to opt out of receiving their voter information guide by mail and accessing it electronically, instead. NOTICE TO ALL PLACER COUNTY VOTERS

As required by state law, all active registered voters will receive a ballot by mail.



- The official ballots will be mailed out to all voters no later than October 10.
- All active registered voters within the county will be mailed a ballot for this election. We encourage voters to vote and return their ballot as soon as possible.
- Ballots can be returned by mail in the prepaid postage return envelope, or;
- Dropped in an official ballot drop box placed throughout the county starting October 11 (see page "DROP" for locations), or;
- Returned in person to any polling place on Election Day.

Why do my districts look different on my ballot?



Following the 2020 Census, districts were redrawn to rebalance populations. What this means to voters is that the districts you are used to seeing on your ballot may have changed. Additionally, polling place numbers and locations may have also changed. The redistricting process considers shifts in population since the last census, making sure constituents are represented equally in accordance with the "one-person, one-vote" principle of the Voting Rights Act.

What if my ballot is misplaced, spoiled or not received?

- Call the Elections Office for instructions on how to request a replacement ballot at 530-886-5650 or email us at vote@placer.ca.gov. This must be requested by November 1, 2022 (7 days before the election).
- Visit the Placer County Elections Office (2956 Richardson Drive, Auburn, CA) to cast a vote-by-mail ballot beginning October 10 through Election Day during the following dates and times:
 - Normal Business Hours, Monday through Friday: 8 AM – 5 PM
 - Monday, October 10: 10 AM – 3 PM
 - Saturday/Sunday, October 29 & 30 and November 5 & 6: 10 AM – 3 PM
 - **Election Day** - Tuesday, November 8: 7 AM – 8 PM
- Visit your Placer County polling place on Election Day. Please review the back page of this voter information guide for your assigned polling place. If you choose to go into the Elections Office or a polling place, please be prepared for the possibility of extended wait times.

Notice to voters – US Senate (full term/partial term)

The ballot includes elections for the succeeding term and for the remainder of the unexpired term of the vacated Senate seat.

There are two U.S. Senate contests on the November 8, 2022, General Election ballot.

The first contest is the regular election for the full 6-year term which begins on January 3, 2023 and ends January 3, 2029.

The second contest is a special vacancy election. The current officeholder is temporarily filling a vacancy for the remainder of the current term ending January 3, 2023 (partial/unexpired term).

You may vote for both contests.

TOP TWO CANDIDATES OPEN PRIMARY ACT VOTER-NOMINATED OFFICES

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices, U.S. congressional offices, and state constitutional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), a general election still must be held.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for U.S. President, county central committee, or local offices.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices can still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate can only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have their qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county Voter Information Guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election, unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Statewide Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate their party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.

Countywide Nonpartisan Offices

For countywide nonpartisan offices at the primary election, if a candidate receives a majority of the vote (more than 50 percent of the ballots cast), then that candidate will be elected to the position and that race will not continue onto the general election ballot in November.

OFFICIAL DROP BOX LOCATIONS

ATTENTION VOTERS: Some drop box locations have changed from the previous election. Please check the list below to find the current drop boxes nearest you.

- Drop box locations are available starting October 11 through Election Day, November 8.
- **Voted ballots can only be received at drop box locations inside the businesses listed below during their business hours and cannot be received after 8 PM on November 8 regardless of the business hours.** There are multiple 24/7 drop box locations throughout the county for your convenience.
- If dropping off at a library location, please do not put your voted ballot into a library book drop-off slot!

To vote for a qualified write-in candidate, write the person's name in the blank space provided for that purpose after the names of the other candidates for the same office. In addition, completely darken in the oval to the left of the candidate's name on the write-in line. To vote for a candidate for Chief Justice of California; Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; or Associate Justice, Court of Appeal, mark the voting target next to the word "Yes." To vote against the candidate, mark the voting target next to the word "No." To vote on any measure, mark the voting target next to the word "Yes" or next to the word "No." Use a blue or black pen only to darken the oval. Marking the ballot outside of the designated space to vote for a candidate or measure may compromise the secrecy of the ballot. If you wrongly mark, tear, or deface this ballot, return it and obtain another.

HOTEL AND LODGING TAX MEASURE

To continue local funding that cannot be taken by the State for City of Roseville essential services such as: 911 emergency response; repairing potholes and streets; neighborhood police patrols; fire protection; addressing blight; and maintaining existing city amenities; shall the measure increasing Roseville's existing transient occupancy tax (paid only by hotel and lodging guests) from 6% set in 1975 to 10% providing an estimated additional \$3 million annually, with independent audits, until ended by voters, be adopted?

ROSEVILLE CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE C

The City Council of the City of Roseville has unanimously placed Measure C on the ballot allowing voters to consider amending the City's Transient Occupancy Tax ("TOT") rate, also known as a hotel and lodging tax, which has remained at the same rate since 1975. This tax is paid only by or on behalf of persons, primarily visitors, who rent a hotel room or short-term rental in the City of Roseville, for stays of 30 consecutive days or less. It is not paid by the property owner. A hotel is defined in the Roseville Municipal Code as any hotel, inn, hostelry, tourist home or house, motel, rooming house, or other lodging place.

If approved, this Measure would amend Section 4.24.030 of the Roseville Municipal Code, increasing the TOT (also known as the hotel and lodging tax) from its current 6% to 10% of rent charged, which would take effect ten (10) days after the certification by the City Council of the passage of the Ordinance by the voters. As an example, based on a daily room rate of \$125, it is estimated that Measure C would increase the cost of an overnight hotel stay by \$5 per night.

The City anticipates that the passage of this Measure would generate an estimated revenue increase of \$2.7 to \$3 million annually. The City may use revenues for any general unrestricted municipal purpose, including, but not limited to, essential services, such as 9-1-1 emergency response; repairing potholes and streets; neighborhood police patrols; fire protection; addressing blight;

maintaining existing and future city amenities; and other general government services.

All revenues collected by Measure C will belong to the City of Roseville and cannot be taken by the federal government or the State of California. Measure C would remain in place unless and until the voters repealed it. Measure C requires that the tax proceeds be placed in the City's general fund and shall be subject to independent annual financial audits. This is a "general tax" and not a "special tax" that restricts the use of funds to a specific purpose.

Measure C will be approved if it receives a majority of "yes" votes.

A "yes" vote is a vote in favor of authorizing the proposed amendment of the Transient Occupancy Tax rate.

A "no" vote is a vote against authorizing the proposed amendment of the Transient Occupancy Tax rate.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF ROSEVILLE AMENDING THE TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX RATE BY AMENDING SECTION 4.24.030 OF CHAPTER 4.24 OF TITLE 4 OF THE ROSEVILLE MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX

THE CITY OF ROSEVILLE ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Section 4.24.030 of Chapter 4.24 of Title 4 of the Roseville Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

4.24.30 Transient occupancy tax—Amount—Where payable.

A. For privilege of occupancy in any hotel, each transient is subject to and shall pay a tax in the amount of ~~six~~ ten percent of the rent charged by the operator. Said tax constitutes a debt owed by the transient

to the city, which is extinguished only by payment to the operator or to the city.

B. The transient shall pay the tax to the operator of the hotel at the time the rent is paid. If the rent is paid in installments, a proportionate share of the tax shall be paid with each installment. The unpaid tax shall be due upon the transient's ceasing to occupy space in the hotel.

C. If, for any reason, the tax due is not paid to the operator of the hotel, the tax administrator may require that such tax be paid directly to the tax administrator.

SECTION 2. This Ordinance relates to the levying and collecting of the City of Roseville Transient Occupancy Tax and, pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9217, shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days after the certification by the City Council of the

election returns indicating passage of the Ordinance by the voters casting votes in the election. The collection of transient occupancy tax shall be in accordance with Chapter 4.24 of the Roseville Municipal Code.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The People of the City of Roseville hereby declare that they would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk is hereby directed to publish a synopsis of the measure in accordance with California Elections Code section 12111 at least one time not later than one week before the election in a newspaper of general circulation in the city. The City Clerk is further directed to cause this Ordinance to be published

in full at least once within fourteen (14) days after approval by the voters in a newspaper of general circulation in the city.

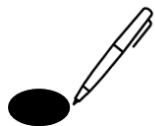

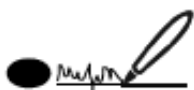

HOW TO FILL OUT YOUR BALLOT

You may use the sample ballot in this guide as reference when filling out your official ballot.



On your official ballot, completely darken the oval next to your selection with **blue or black ink**.



If you are voting for a qualified write-in candidate, you must completely fill in the oval AND write the name of the candidate in the space provided. **Unless both steps are completed, your vote for a write-in candidate cannot be counted.**



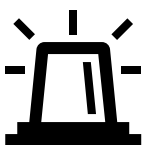
DO NOT make partial marks when you make your selections. X marks, check marks, and other kinds of partial shading on the ovals are not the right ways to fill out your ballot.



Remember to check both sides of the ballot.



Place your ballot in the return envelope and sign your name next to the red "X" before sealing.



**Did you make a mistake marking your ballot?
Lost it? Damaged it? Never received it?**

No problem! Here are two options you have:

1. You can request a replacement ballot to be mailed to you through November 1.
2. You can obtain a replacement vote-by-mail ballot at the Elections Office in Auburn beginning October 10, or vote with a poll ballot at your assigned polling place on Election Day.

Contact the Elections Office if you have any questions. You can find our contact information on the front cover of this guide.

On the next page is a list of precincts that will have translated sample ballots in Spanish, Tagalog, Korean or Punjabi, that voters can use as a reference tool when voting. The precincts that will have them are determined by the Secretary of State. To find out if your precinct will have a translated sample ballot, please see the table on the next page or go online to www.placercountyelections.gov/languages. If a polling place has a translated sample ballot for the precinct in Spanish, Tagalog, Korean, or Punjabi, you can ask the staff for it when at the location.

Requests must be received no later than seven (7) days before Election Day.

Voting Assistance

If you need assistance when voting, you may bring up to two people with you to a polling place, as long as they are not representatives of your employer or your union. Bring a family member or friend!

ACCESSIBILITY/REMOTE ACCESSIBLE VOTE BY MAIL

Placer County has taken measures to ensure that our voters with specific accessibility needs can participate in the elections process.



Accessible online voter information guide and ballot: The online version of this voter information guide and the voter's precinct-specific accessible vote-by-mail ballot are both compatible with screen readers. Information on how to access them can be found at www.placercountyelections.gov.



Accessible voting equipment: The touchscreen machines at all polling places and the Elections Office allow voters with specific disabilities to cast their ballots in an independent and private manner. The voting equipment is compatible with audio tactile interface (ATI), sip 'n' puff, and paddles. Ballots can be presented in audio only, visual only, or both audio/visual.



Accessible voting locations: Every polling place in Placer County has been surveyed by the Elections Office and we have attempted to mitigate all barriers to make them accessible to all voters.

Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail (RAVBM)

The Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system, or RAVBM, was implemented by California to make voting more convenient for voters with disabilities. Assembly Bill 37 permits any voter to cast a ballot using the RAVBM system for any election. To ensure voters' privacy, the system does not store or transmit votes over the internet. Instead, the ballot is printed and returned by mail or by hand.

Who is eligible to use the RAVBM system? Any registered Placer County voter is eligible to use the Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system. The voter must have internet access and a printer to mark, print and return their ballot for counting.

Is the RAVBM system secure? Yes. The Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system has been certified by the California Secretary of State. The RAVBM system does not store or transmit the voter's selections over the internet. Although the RAVBM system allows voters to access and mark their ballots using any computer and their own assistive devices, the system does not allow electronic voting.

How do I access my ballot through the RAVBM system? Registered voters can apply for a remote accessible ballot by phone, email, on our website, or on the Secretary of State's website. Once the application is processed in our office, a link to access your voting materials electronically will be sent to the email supplied during the request.

How do I return my ballot? After you are finished marking your ballot, it will need to be printed and returned, either by mail or in person, for signature checking and tabulation.

When will the RAVBM system be available? Ballots will be available through this system beginning October 10 and until 8 PM on Election Day, November 8. Remember, if returned by mail, it must be postmarked on or before November 8, and received by the Elections Office no later than November 15, 2022 for your ballot to be considered on time and counted.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the last day to register to vote?

State law allows voters to register up until 15 days before the election. The registration deadline for the November 8, 2022, General Election is **Monday, October 24, 2022**. You must register by this date to receive voting materials by mail for this election. However, conditional voter registration (CVR) is now available in California. Eligible voters who missed the 15-day registration deadline can go to the Elections Office from 14 days before Election Day (October 25) through the day of the election or to their polling place on Election Day (November 8), and conditionally register to vote.

When does my ballot get counted?

No ballot can be “counted” until the polls close at 8 PM on Election Day. However, state law allows county election officials to begin opening and processing vote-by-mail ballots up to 29 calendar days before Election Day for the November 8, 2022, General Election.

If you vote the ballot that was mailed to you, your ballot will usually be processed within 24 hours of arriving at our office. That means if you mail your ballot back to us early enough, it will be processed before Election Day and become part of the results published at 8 PM that night.

If you vote at a polling place, your ballot will be tallied that day and included in the results after the polling place materials are delivered to our Elections Office in Auburn. These materials are delivered after the closing of the polling place on Election Day.

The last ballots to be counted are the vote-by-mail ballots mailed or dropped off at drop boxes a few days before Election Day or at polling places on Election Day, ballots mailed and postmarked by November 8, 2022 that are delivered by the post office up to seven (7) days after the election (November 15), and the provisional ballots or CVR ballots cast at polling places. These ballots are processed during the 30-day period following the election that is known as “Post-Election Canvass.”

What happens to provisional ballots and CVR ballots after the election? When are they counted?

Every provisional and CVR ballot cast in Placer County is individually reviewed for eligibility after all materials from the polling places are returned and secured. The most frequent reasons for determining that a provisional or CVR ballot is not eligible to be counted are 1) the ballot envelope is not filled out correctly or 2) the voter cast a ballot through another mechanism (voted by mail or at another location or county within the state). Provisional and CVR ballots are usually counted within 48 hours after they are deemed eligible.

How do I work at a polling place?

It's easy! If you would like to become a poll worker, you can contact our office at 530-886-5650 or visit our website at www.placercountyelections.gov/serve-as-a-poll-worker-in-placer-county and apply for a Poll Worker position.

I changed my signature since I first registered to vote. Will it matter?

Yes, if your signature on your vote-by-mail ballot envelope does not compare with your voter registration signature, we cannot count your ballot. We will make our best effort to compare the signature on file to the one we find on the envelope you use to return the ballot. If for any reason we cannot determine it is a match, we will contact you by mail with a form you may use to confirm it was you that voted the ballot. If you are unsure of how you signed your most recent registration, we recommend that you call our office, and we will mail you a voter registration card. Alternatively, you can re-register online at registertovote.ca.gov. Re-registering will allow you to update our records so that we have a current signature on file for verification purposes.

IMPORTANT DATES

October 10, 2022 **BALLOTS MAILED TO VOTERS**

Ballots will be mailed no later than this date to all active registered voters in Placer County. If you lose or incorrectly mark your ballot, you may request a replacement ballot be mailed to you through November 1 or visit the Placer County Elections Office and cast a vote-by-mail ballot in person through Election Day.

October 24, 2022 **LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO RECEIVE A BALLOT BY MAIL**

You must be registered by this date to receive voting materials by mail for this election. After this date, you must visit the Elections Office through Election Day or a polling place on Election Day to complete a Conditional Voter Registration and vote.

Just Moved? If you were already registered in the county and moved to a different address within the county (but did not re-register), you may vote at your new polling place on Election Day or the Elections Office from October 24 through Election Day, November 8, 2022.

November 1, 2022 **LAST DAY FOR THE ELECTIONS OFFICE TO MAIL YOU A BALLOT**

This is the last day to request a replacement ballot to be mailed to you. For instructions on how to request a replacement ballot, please call the Elections Office at 530-886-5650 or e-mail us at vote@placer.ca.gov.

November 8, 2022 **ELECTION DAY! POLLING PLACES OPEN**

Polling places will be open from 7 AM to 8 PM. You may drop off your voted ballot to any polling place. However, if you prefer to vote at your designated polling place instead, bring your mailed ballot and envelope with you to avoid voting a provisional ballot. **Please note - your polling place may have changed. Check the back cover for your polling place location.**

Important Things to Remember:

If you require a replacement ballot, you may stop by the Elections Office to obtain a replacement vote-by-mail ballot. You may also go to your assigned polling place in Placer County on Election Day and receive a poll ballot. Bring the original ballot and envelope that was mailed to you to avoid the potential of voting a provisional ballot.

- If you are coming in to pick up a replacement ballot for another person, you will need written authorization from that voter. If you are dropping off a completed ballot for another voter, make sure the authorization section of the envelope has been completed.
- For a mailed ballot to be considered on time and counted, it must be postmarked on or before November 8, 2022, and received by our Elections Office no later than November 15, 2022.
- Do not forget to **sign** the back of your vote-by-mail ballot envelope next to the red "X". The envelope flap will cover your signature so nobody will see it until it is matched by Elections Office personnel.

All active voters will receive an official ballot by mail for the November 8, 2022, General Election. Ballots will be mailed by October 10. Enclosed is your sample ballot. If you do not receive your ballot by October 20, please call 530-886-5650.

How to Return Your Voted Ballot:

By Mail:



You may vote your ballot anytime between receiving it and Election Day. Vote early and have your ballot released in the count on Election Night! If you vote your ballot early, mail it back to us in the prepaid postage envelope provided. Your ballot must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by November 15 in order to be counted.

In Person:



Hand deliver your ballot to the Auburn Elections Office or to any polling place or vote center in California.

At a Drop Box Location:



We offer many official ballot drop boxes throughout Placer County in the 28 days prior to Election Day. Make sure your ballot is sealed inside its return envelope and that you have completed and signed your envelope before dropping it in the official drop box! Many locations have changed. See page "DROP" for a list of boxes/hours.

At a Polling Place:



If you have an assigned polling place, it will be listed at the top left side of this page. You may visit this location on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8, where you can drop off your voted ballot, receive assistance, or bring in your ballot and envelope that was mailed to you and vote in person instead.
