NOTICE TO VOTERS - CALIFORNIA ELECTIONS CODE, SECTION 13312

Pursuant to CA Elections Code, Section 13312, this notice is to inform voters that the county voter information guide does not contain a complete list of candidates and that a complete list of candidates appears on the sample ballot.

Each candidate's statement in the county voter information guide is volunteered by the candidate and is printed at his or her expense.

CHECK YOUR REGISTRATION: If you have interacted with the DMV, <u>your voter registration information may have been inadvertently changed</u>. It is important to confirm your voter status, political party affiliation, and other information to make sure you are still registered correctly. Check your status at <u>voterstatus.sos.ca.gov</u>.

- ★ DAMAGED BALLOTS: If you incorrectly mark, tear or spoil any portion of your ballot, a replacement ballot can be issued. Please contact the Placer County Elections Office for instructions you can find our contact information on the front cover of this guide.
- ★ LOST THE BALLOT MAILED TO YOU: If you lose, misplace or discard your ballot that was mailed to you, you may request a replacement ballot be sent to you or vote a ballot in person at the Elections Office in Auburn beginning October 10. Contact the Elections Office for directions you can find our contact information on the front cover of this guide.
- ★ VOTING BY MAIL: Postage is not necessary when returning your ballot. After you have completed voting, review your choices one final time to be sure they are correct and place your ballot in the return envelope provided. Be sure to sign and date the envelope where required. The envelope must have your signature on it, or the ballot cannot be counted. Return the envelope according to the instructions you receive with your ballot. If you wish to return your voted ballot by mail, it must be postmarked by Election Day, November 8, and received by the Elections Office no later than Tuesday, November 15 for your ballot to count. We encourage you to mail your ballot early so it will arrive on time. If you wish to return your voted ballot in person, it must be hand-delivered at or before 8 PM on Election Day. For your convenience, we have various types of ballot drop-off locations in the county, including 24-hour boxes. For additional information on drop box hours and locations in Placer County, see page "DROP."
- ★ VOTING AT YOUR POLLING PLACE: If you would prefer to vote at your polling place instead of by mail, bring your ballot and envelope with you to avoid the potential of voting a provisional ballot. After you have completed voting your poll ballot, look over your choices one final time to be sure they are correct, place your ballot in the secrecy sleeve, and deposit the ballot into the ballot scanner. Please note your polling place may have changed. Check the back cover of this guide for your polling place.
- ★ OPTIONS FOR RECEIVING YOUR VOTER INFORMATION GUIDE: State law (AB 1717, established in 2010) allows voters to opt out of receiving their voter information guide by mail and accessing it electronically, instead. NOTICE TO ALL PLACER COUNTY VOTERS

As required by state law, all active registered voters will receive a ballot by mail.



- The official ballots will be mailed out to all voters no later than October 10.
- All active registered voters within the county will be mailed a ballot for this election. We encourage voters to vote and return their ballot as soon as possible.
- Ballots can be returned by mail in the prepaid postage return envelope, or;
- Dropped in an official ballot drop box placed throughout the county starting October 11 (see page "DROP" for locations), or;
- Returned in person to any polling place on Election Day.

Why do my districts look different on my ballot?



Following the 2020 Census, districts were redrawn to rebalance populations. What this means to voters is that the districts you are used to seeing on your ballot may have changed. Additionally, polling place numbers and locations may have also changed. The redistricting process considers shifts in population since the last census, making sure constituents are represented equally in accordance with the "one-person, one-vote" principle of the Voting Rights Act.

What if my ballot is misplaced, spoiled or not received?

 - Election Day Tuesday, November 8: 7 AM 8 PM
- Visit your Placer County polling place on Election Day. <u>Please review the back page of this voter information guide for your assigned polling place</u>. If you choose to go into the Elections Office or a polling place, please be prepared for the possibility of extended wait times.

Notice to voters - US Senate (full term/partial term)

The ballot includes elections for the succeeding term and for the remainder of the unexpired term of the vacated Senate seat.

There are two U.S. Senate contests on the November 8, 2022, General Election ballot.

The first contest is the regular election for the full 6-year term which begins on January 3, 2023 and ends January 3, 2029.

The second contest is a special vacancy election. The current officeholder is temporarily filling a vacancy for the remainder of the current term ending January 3, 2023 (partial/unexpired term).

You may vote for both contests.

TOP TWO CANDIDATES OPEN PRIMARY ACT VOTER-NOMINATED OFFICES

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices, U.S. congressional offices, and state constitutional offices.

In both the open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), a general election still must be held.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for U.S. President, county central committee, or local offices.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices can still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate can only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have their qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county Voter Information Guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office, if they meet the other qualifications required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election, unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Statewide Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate their party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.

Countywide Nonpartisan Offices

For countywide nonpartisan offices at the primary election, if a candidate receives a majority of the vote (more than 50 percent of the ballots cast), then that candidate will be elected to the position and that race will not continue onto the general election ballot in November.

- o Drop box locations are available starting October 11 through Election Day, November 8.
- Voted ballots can only be received at drop box locations inside the businesses listed below during their business hours and cannot be received after 8 PM on November 8 regardless of the business hours. There are multiple 24/7 drop box locations throughout the county for your convenience.
- o If dropping off at a library location, please do not put your voted ballot into a library book drop-off slot!

To vote for a qualified write-in candidate, write the person's name in the blank space provided for that purpose after the names of the other candidates for the same office. In addition, completely darken in the oval to the left of the candidate's name on the write-in line. To vote for a candidate for Chief Justice of California, Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; or Associate Justice, Court of Appeal, mark the voting target next to the word "Yes." To vote against the candidate, mark the voting target next to the word "No." To vote on any measure, mark the voting target next to the word "No." To vote on any carrier, mark the voting target next to the word "No." Use a blue or black pen only to darken the oval. Marking the ballot outside of the designated space to vote for a candidate or measure may compromise the secrecy of the ballot. If you wrongly mark, tear, or deface this ballot, return it and obtain another.



CITY ATTORNEY'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE F

Transient Occupancy Tax- Amendment to Rocklin Municipal Code Chapter 5.24

This Measure contains a proposed amendment to Chapter 5.24 of the City of Rocklin Municipal Code with respect to the City's transient occupancy tax (TOT). The Measure would increase the City's Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) from eight (8) percent to ten (10) percent and expand its application to campgrounds. TOT is a tax charged to guests of hotels and similar short-term lodging, who stay for a period of 30 days or less. Hotel operators collect the tax when guests pay for their accommodations and then remit the tax to the City.

The TOT is a general tax, meaning the additional revenue generated by the increased TOT would be deposited into the City's general fund and may be used for any unrestricted general governmental purpose, including but not limited to police and fire services, street and park maintenance. The financial analysis prepared by the city estimates \$1.1 million in TOT revenues were generated

during fiscal year 2021/2022, with the potential of generating an additional \$300,000 annually if the TOT rate is increased to ten (10) percent.

A "Yes" vote increases the Transient Occupancy Tax rate in the City of Rocklin from eight (8) to ten (10) percent and expands its application to campgrounds.

A "No" vote does not increase the Transient Occupancy Tax rate in the City of Rocklin or expand its application to campgrounds, and the City would continue to collect the tax at its current rate.

The measure requires a simple majority vote for approval, and was placed on the ballot by the Rocklin City Council.

ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE F

One of the top reasons that Rocklin is a premier community is that we are a safe community - one of the safest in Northern California.

A yes vote on Measure F would provide more resources for the city's essential services, including police and fire, and ensure that visitors to our community pay their fair share for the services they use while in Rocklin.

The measure would increase the Transient Occupancy Tax, which is charged on hotel rooms, from 8% to 10% and would equal the rate currently charged by Lincoln and proposed to be charged by Roseville. The charge is a direct and fair way to recover the increased costs associated with visitor stays in Rocklin. In addition, the tax would also apply if a business were to open an RV or campground area for short-term stays. A yes vote will help to maintain quality community services without raising taxes on the City's residents or businesses.

Raising the charge on hotel rooms will not hurt tourism. A 2% increase in TOT equates to about \$2.40 per night, is in line with the region and state, and is much less than major tourist destinations.

The tax dollars generated from TOT fund essential local services; and the proposed increase achieves an important balance between maintaining competitiveness for tourism, while providing an opportunity to fund essential City services.

The dollars raised will help fund critical City services, and none of the money can be taken away from the State. All Measure F revenue will stay here in the City of Rocklin.

ORDINANCE NO.

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF ROCKLIN AMENDING THE DEFINITION OF HOTEL AND AMENDING THE TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX RATE BY REPEALING AND REENACTING SECTIONS 5.24.020, 5.24.030, AND 5.24.040 OF CHAPTER 5.24 OF THE ROCKLIN MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX

The city council of the City of Rocklin does ordain as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Section 5.24.020 of Chapter 5.24 of Title 5 of the Rocklin Municipal Code is hereby repealed and replaced in its entirety as follows:

5.24.020 - Definitions:

Except where the context otherwise requires, the definitions given in this section govern the construction of this chapter:

"Hotel" means any structure, or any portion of any structure which is occupied or intended or designed for occupancy by transients for dwelling, lodging or sleeping purposes, and includes any hotel, inn, tourist home or house, motel, studio hotel, bachelor hotel, lodging house, rooming house, apartment house, dormitory, public or private club, mobile home or house trailer, or campground at a fixed location or other similar structure or portion thereof.

"Occupancy" means the use or possession, or the right to the use or possession of any room or rooms or portion thereof, in any hotel for dwelling, lodging or sleeping purposes.

"Operator" means the person who is proprietor of the hotel, whether in the capacity of owner, lessee, sublessee, mortgagee in possession, licensee or any other capacity. Where the operator performs his or her functions through a managing agent of any type or character other than an employee, the managing agent shall also be deemed an operator for the purposes of this chapter and shall have the same duties and liabilities as his or her principal. Compliance with the provisions of this chapter by either the principal or the managing agent shall, however, be considered to be compliance by both.

"Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, joint venture, association, social club, fraternal organization, joint stock company, corporation, estate, trust, business trust, receiver, trustee, syndicate or any other group or combination acting as a unit.

"Rent" means the consideration charged whether or not received, for the occupancy of space in a hotel valued in money, whether to be received in money, goods, labor or otherwise, including all receipts, cash, credits and property and services of any kind or nature, without any deduction therefrom whatsoever.

"Tax administrator" means the City finance manager, or his or her designee.

"Transient" means any person who exercises occupancy or is entitled to occupancy by reason of concession, permit, right of access, license or other agreement for a period of thirty consecutive calendar days or less, counting portions of calendar days as full days. Any such person so occupying space in a hotel shall be deemed to be a transient until the period of thirty days has expired unless there is an agreement in writing between the operator and the occupant providing for a longer period of occupancy. In determining whether a person is a transient, uninterrupted periods of time extending both, prior and subsequent to the effective date of this chapter may be considered.

<u>Section 2.</u> Section 5.24.020 of Chapter 5.24 of Title 5 of the Rocklin Municipal Code is hereby repealed and replaced in its entirety as follows:

5.24.030 -Tax Imposed - Generally:

For the privilege of occupancy in any hotel, each transient is subject to and shall pay a tax in the amount of ten percent of the rent charged by the operator. Such tax constitutes a debt owed by the transient to the city which is extinguished only by payment to the operator or to the city. The transient shall pay the tax to the operator of the hotel at the time the rent is paid. If the rent is paid in installments, a proportionate share of the tax shall be paid with each installment. The unpaid tax shall be due upon the transient's ceasing to occupy space in the hotel. If for any reason the tax due is not paid to the operator of the hotel, the tax administrator may require that such tax be paid directly to the tax administrator.

The tax administrator may make rules and regulations not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter as may be necessary or desirable to aid in the enforcement and administration of this chapter. Any such rule or regulation that may affect the amount of tax owed the city shall be subject to approval of the city council. The rules and regulations shall be filed in the office of the tax administrator and maintained in an orderly and readily accessible manner. Taxes are considered paid only upon receipt of the return, and penalty, interest, and completed

exemption certificate when appropriate. The burden to secure and comply with the rules and regulations shall be upon the operator.

<u>Section 3.</u> Section 5.24.040 of Chapter 5.24 of Title 5 of the Rocklin Municipal Code is hereby repealed and replaced in its entirety as follows:

5.24.040 - Exemptions

No tax shall be imposed upon any person if the imposition is beyond the power of the city as herein provided. Without limitation, the following are specifically exempt:

Any federal or state employee when on official business.

Any officer or employee of a foreign government who is exempt by reason of express provision of federal law or international treaty.

Any of the exclusions and/or exemptions set forth in California Revenue and Tax Code section 7280 et seq., as may be amended from time to time.

No exemption shall be granted except upon a claim made at the time rent is collected and under penalty of perjury upon a form prescribed by the tax administrator. When a claim of exemption is defective, the operator: (1) shall be responsible for all taxes due with respect to the purposed exempt transient; and (ii) the tax administrator shall give notice to the operator of all taxes due as a result of rejection of the exemption claims. The operator shall pay all sums due within ten working days of notification.

Section 4. This Ordinance relates to the levying and collecting of the City of Rocklin Transient Occupancy Tax and, pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9217, shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days after the certification by the City Council of the election returns indicating passage of the Ordinance by the voters casting votes in the election. The collection of transient occupancy tax shall be in accordance with Chapter 5.24 of the Rocklin Municipal Code.

Section 5. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance, is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City council hereby declares that they would have adopted this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivision, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 6. Within 15 days of passage of this ordinance, the City Clerk shall cause the full text of the ordinance, a summary of the ordinance, or an advertisement of the ordinance to be published in a newspaper of general circulation, with the names of those City Council members voting for and against the ordinance, in accordance with Government Code section 36933.




ACCESSIBILITY/REMOTE ACCESSIBLE VOTE BY MAIL

Placer County has taken measures to ensure that our voters with specific accessibility needs can participate in the elections process.











Accessible voting locations: Every polling place in Placer County has been surveyed by the Elections Office and we have attempted to mitigate all barriers to make them accessible to all voters.

Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail (RAVBM)

The Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system, or RAVBM, was implemented by California to make voting more convenient for voters with disabilities. Assembly Bill 37 permits any voter to cast a ballot using the RAVBM system for any election. To ensure voters' privacy, the system does not store or transmit votes over the internet. Instead, the ballot is printed and returned by mail or by hand.

Who is eligible to use the RAVBM system? Any registered Placer County voter is eligible to use the Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system. The voter must have internet access and a printer to mark, print and return their ballot for counting.

Is the RAVBM system secure? Yes. The Remote Accessible Vote-by-Mail system has been certified by the California Secretary of State. The RAVBM system does not store or transmit the voter's selections over the internet. Although the RAVBM system allows voters to access and mark their ballots using any computer and their own assistive devices, the system does not allow electronic voting.

How do I access my ballot through the RAVBM system? Registered voters can apply for a remote accessible ballot by phone, email, on our website, or on the Secretary of State's website. Once the application is processed in our office, a link to access your voting materials electronically will be sent to the email supplied during the request.

How do I return my ballot? After you are finished marking your ballot, it will need to be printed and returned, either by mail or in person, for signature checking and tabulation.

When will the RAVBM system be available? Ballots will be available through this system beginning October 10 and until 8 PM on Election Day, November 8. Remember, if returned by mail, it must be postmarked on or before November 8, and received by the Elections Office no later than November 15, 2022 for your ballot to be considered on time and counted.

Serve as a Placer County Poll Worker for the November 8, 2022, General Election!

Working alongside their precinct board, and supported by the Elections Office staff, poll workers play an essential role in making sure that Placer County's elections are secure and conducted in strict accordance with state and federal voting laws. Volunteers learn about the election process and serve their community by protecting voter rights, securing our systems, serving voters with respect, and assisting all voters with casting their vote.

A precinct board consists of an Inspector, Judge, and Clerks. Poll workers are eligible to receive a stipend that can range from \$100-\$160, depending on the position. Paid training is also provided. Volunteering can also be a great fundraising opportunity for your service club, school booster club or church group. Groups can earn up to \$900 by attending training classes and staffing an entire precinct board on Election Day!

Volunteers must be able to work from **6:00 AM to 9:00 PM on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8**. Apply by filling out the form on the next page and mailing, emailing, or faxing it back to us. HOW TO FILL OUT YOUR BALLOT

You may use the sample ballot in this guide as reference when filling out your official ballot.



On your official ballot, completely darken the oval next to your selection with **blue** or **black ink**.



If you are voting for a qualified write-in candidate, you must completely fill in the oval AND write the name of the candidate in the space provided. **Unless both steps are completed, your vote for a write-in candidate cannot be counted.**



DO NOT make partial marks when you make your selections. X marks, check marks, and other kinds of partial shading on the ovals are not the right ways to fill out your ballot.



Remember to check both sides of the ballot.



Place your ballot in the return envelope and sign your name next to the red "X" before sealing.



Did you make a mistake marking your ballot? Lost it? Damaged it? Never received it?

No problem! Here are two options you have:

- 1. You can request a replacement ballot to be mailed to you through November 1.
- 2. You can obtain a replacement vote-by-mail ballot at the Elections Office in Auburn beginning October 10, or vote with a poll ballot at your assigned polling place on Election Day.

Candidate Workshops

Official Election Mail Logo

The United States Postal Service and the Joint Elections Official Liaison Committee worked together to develop an Official Election Logo for use by state and local government officials. The unique trademark logo is now incorporated into the design of Placer County election mail pieces.

The logo is an interpretation of the stars and stripes of the American flag, with the words "Official Election Mail" above the designation "Authorized by the U.S. Postal Service." When the logo appears on official election correspondence, voters will recognize it as important mail and distinct from partisan political mailings. Additionally, the logo will distinguish the mail to Postal Service workers as "Official Election Mail" and expedite delivery of this important material.

In addition, every household will be mailed a voter information guide from the Secretary of State's Office that will include information for the statewide candidates on the ballot, as well as any propositions and constitutional amendments. You may access the state voter information guide by scanning the QR code to the left or visit the Secretary of State's website at voterguide.sos.ca.gov.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is the last day to register to vote?

State law allows voters to register up until 15 days before the election. The registration deadline for the November 8, 2022, General Election is **Monday**, **October 24**, **2022**. You must register by this date to receive voting materials <u>by mail</u> for this election. However, conditional voter registration (CVR) is now available in California. Eligible voters who missed the 15-day registration deadline can go to the Elections Office from 14 days before Election Day (October 25) through the day of the election or to their polling place on Election Day (November 8), and conditionally register to vote.

When does my ballot get counted?

No ballot can be "counted" until the polls close at 8 PM on Election Day. However, state law allows county election officials to begin opening and processing vote-by-mail ballots up to 29 calendar days before Election Day for the November 8, 2022, General Election.

If you vote the ballot that was mailed to you, your ballot will usually be processed within 24 hours of arriving at our office. That means if you mail your ballot back to us early enough, it will be processed before Election Day and become part of the results published at 8 PM that night.

If you vote at a polling place, your ballot will be tallied that day and included in the results after the polling place materials are delivered to our Elections Office in Auburn. These materials are delivered after the closing of the polling place on Election Day.

The last ballots to be counted are the vote-by-mail ballots mailed or dropped off at drop boxes a few days before Election Day or at polling places on Election Day, ballots mailed and postmarked by November 8, 2022 that are delivered by the post office up to seven (7) days after the election (November 15), and the provisional ballots or CVR ballots cast at polling places. These ballots are processed during the 30-day period following the election that is known as "Post-Election Canvass."

What happens to provisional ballots and CVR ballots after the election? When are they counted?

Every provisional and CVR ballot cast in Placer County is individually reviewed for eligibility after all materials from the polling places are returned and secured. The most frequent reasons for determining that a provisional or CVR ballot is not eligible to be counted are 1) the ballot envelope is not filled out correctly or 2) the voter cast a ballot through another mechanism (voted by mail or at another location or county within the state). Provisional and CVR ballots are usually counted within 48 hours after they are deemed eligible.

How do I work at a polling place?

It's easy! If you would like to become a poll worker, you can contact our office at 530-886-5650 or visit our website at www.placercountyelections.gov/serve-as-a-poll-worker-in-placer-county and apply for a Poll Worker position.

I changed my signature since I first registered to vote. Will it matter?

Yes, if your signature on your vote-by-mail ballot envelope does not compare with your voter registration signature, we cannot count your ballot. We will make our best effort to compare the signature on file to the one we find on the envelope you use to return the ballot. If for any reason we cannot determine it is a match, we will contact you by mail with a form you may use to confirm it was you that voted the ballot. If you are unsure of how you signed your most recent registration, we recommend that you call our office, and we will mail you a voter registration card. Alternatively, you can re-register online at registertovote.ca.gov. Re-registering will allow you to update our records so that we have a current signature on file for verification purposes.

ELECTIONS OFFICE OUTREACH PROGRAMS

Student Poll Worker Program

California legislation enacted in 1997 and modified in 2007 allows high school students who are U.S. citizens aged 16 years or older with at least a 2.5 grade point average to work as poll workers in California polling places. By participating as poll workers, students gain hands-on experience in the elections process and broaden their understanding of democracy while also serving their community.

Students throughout Placer County have participated in the Student Poll Worker Program at every major election and most special elections since early 1997. From around 6 AM to 9 PM on Election Day, student poll workers will serve at polling places throughout Placer County. They are paid the poll worker stipend and training incentive. If you are a student or know of a student who would be interested in serving, please contact the Elections Office at 530-886-5650.



High School Voter Outreach

This program was implemented for Placer County high schools in 1995 to educate high school students approaching the legal voting age about our political system and to encourage them to participate in elections. The students are given information regarding the various political parties and races and are encouraged to ask questions. Most of the 1½-hour sessions include officeholders who share their perspectives on political issues.

Students are welcomed to either pre-register or register to vote as part of the program, and a great number of them vote for the first time after they graduate. This program has been received exceptionally well by both the students and the community. According to the California Civic Engagement Project by the UC Davis Center for Regional Change, Placer County is among the top counties in the state for the percentage of eligible youth voters who are both registered to vote and who participate on Election Day.

Senior Citizen Voter Outreach

Voter registration and turnout are highest among our senior citizen population. To prevent any lapse in voter registration for these groups, we implemented an innovative outreach program for citizens who have moved into senior residential and assisted care facilities. Elections staff work with these facilities to aid new residents in updating their voter registration so they can receive their voting material for each election.

IMPORTANT DATES

October 10, 2022 BALLOTS MAILED TO VOTERS

Ballots will be mailed no later than this date to all active registered voters in Placer County. If you lose or incorrectly mark your ballot, you may request a replacement ballot be mailed to you through November 1 or visit the Placer County Elections Office and cast a vote-by-mail ballot in person through Election Day.

October 24, 2022 LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO RECEIVE A BALLOT BY MAIL

You must be registered by this date to receive voting materials <u>by mail</u> for this election. After this date, you must visit the Elections Office through Election Day or a polling place on Election Day to complete a Conditional Voter Registration and vote.

Just Moved? If you were already registered in the county and moved to a different address within the county (but did not re-register), you may vote at your new polling place on Election Day or the Elections Office from October 24 through Election Day, November 8, 2022.

November 1, 2022 LAST DAY FOR THE ELECTIONS OFFICE TO MAIL YOU A BALLOT

This is the last day to request a replacement ballot to be mailed to you. For instructions on how to request a replacement ballot, please call the Elections Office at 530-886-5650 or e-mail us at vote@placer.ca.gov.

November 8, 2022 ELECTION DAY! POLLING PLACES OPEN

Polling places will be open from 7 AM to 8 PM. You may drop off your voted ballot to any polling place. However, if you prefer to vote at your designated polling place instead, bring your mailed ballot and envelope with you to avoid voting a provisional ballot. Please note - your polling place may have changed. Check the back cover for your polling place location.

Important Things to Remember:

If you require a replacement ballot, you may stop by the Elections Office to obtain a replacement vote-by-mail ballot. You may also go to your assigned polling place in Placer County on Election Day and receive a poll ballot. Bring the original ballot and envelope that was mailed to you to avoid the potential of voting a provisional ballot.

- If you are coming in to pick up a replacement ballot for another person, you will need written authorization from that voter. If you are dropping off a completed ballot for another voter, make sure the authorization section of the envelope has been completed.
- For a mailed ballot to be considered on time and counted, it must be postmarked on or before November 8, 2022, and received by our Elections Office no later than November 15, 2022.
- Do not forget to <u>sign</u> the back of your vote-by-mail ballot envelope next to the red "X". The envelope flap will cover your signature so nobody will see it until it is matched by Elections Office personnel.

All active voters will receive an official ballot by mail for the November 8, 2022, General Election. Ballots will be mailed by October 10. Enclosed is your <u>sample</u> ballot. If you do not receive your ballot by October 20, please call 530-886-5650.

How to Return Your Voted Ballot:

By Mail:



You may vote your ballot anytime between receiving it and Election Day. Vote early and have your ballot released in the count on Election Night! If you vote your ballot early, mail it back to us in the prepaid postage envelope provided. Your ballot must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by November 15 in order to be counted.

In Person:



Hand deliver your ballot to the Auburn Elections Office or to any polling place or vote center in California.

At a Drop Box Location:



We offer many official ballot drop boxes throughout Placer County in the 28 days prior to Election Day. Make sure your ballot is sealed inside its return envelope that you have completed and and before official sianed your envelope dropping it in Many locations have changed. See page "DROP" for a list of boxes/hours.

At a Polling Place:



If you have an assigned polling place, it will be listed at the top left side of this page. You may visit this location on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8, where you can drop off your voted ballot, receive assistance, or bring in your ballot and envelope that was mailed to you and vote in person instead.
