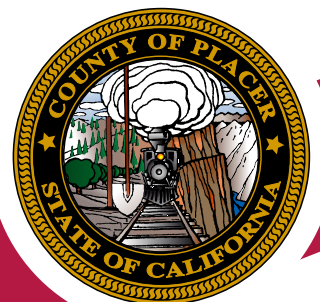

Vote in Person

You can vote at any vote center in Placer County!

A vote center officer will ask for your name, address and signature, then issue you a ballot. You can also bring your vote-by-mail ballot with you to save time!

Follow the instructions on the ballot to fill it out correctly. When you are done voting, cast your ballot using the ballot scanner.

Track Ballot

Vote Using Your Vote-By-Mail Ballot



Vote-by-mail ballots for all eligible, active Placer County voters will be in the mail by May 4.

Fill out your ballot and seal it in its return envelope. **Sign and date** the back of the envelope next to the red X. If your signature is missing or doesn't compare with your voter record signature(s), your ballot won't be counted until you correct the issue with our office.

Return your ballot by 8 p.m. on Election Day, June 2, using one of these three methods:

- ★ **Drop Box** – Starting May 5, 29 secure drop boxes throughout Placer County will be available for use. Ballots will be picked up by staff and most boxes will be available 24 hours a day.
- ★ **Vote Center** – Starting May 23, cast your vote-by-mail ballot using the ballot scanner at a vote center. Just **Sign, Scan & Go!** Drop-off options are also available.
- ★ **Mail** – Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked on or before Election Day (June 2) and received by June 9 to be counted. Mail your ballot early, especially if mailing from outside Placer County.

Get a Replacement Ballot or Envelope

You may request up to two replacement ballots if you lose, damage, mismark or never receive your ballot. Let us know if all you need is a new return envelope.

To request a new ballot in the mail, call our office or email vote@placer.ca.gov by **May 26**. For email requests, please include your full name, residence address and date of birth, as well as the election date.

You can always vote in person or get a ballot to go at any vote center or the Placer County Elections Office.

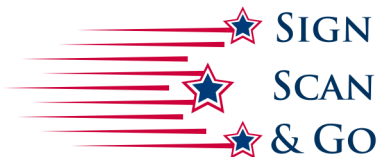
What’s New

Voter’s Choice Act

Placer County is a Voter’s Choice Act county, so assigned polling places are now regional vote centers.

You can **vote in person at any Placer County vote center location**. Seven locations will open starting May 23, and 23 more will open May 30. Vote centers close at 8 p.m. on Election Day.

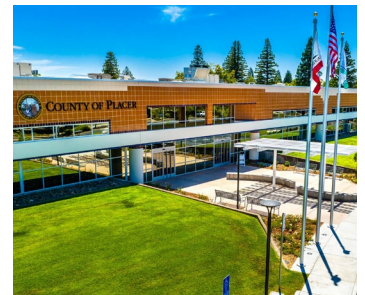


Speed up the voting process and **bring your vote-by-mail ballot to a vote center to watch it be counted in front of you!** Simply **sign** the roster at the check-in table, **scan** your ballot using the ballot scanner and **go!**

New Rocklin Office

In August 2023, the Placer County Clerk-Recorder-Elections Office expanded into a renovated building at 3715 Atherton Road in Rocklin. This new location is closer to most of the county’s population, unifies our office space with the elections warehouse and features a modern training room for election officer training, candidate workshops, county meetings and community events.

The Placer County Clerk-Recorder Office at 2954 Richardson Drive in Auburn will still host a drop box. There will also be an 11-day vote center at this location May 23 – June 2.





VOTER'S CHOICE ACT

Placer County Is a Voter's Choice Act County!

Placer County adopted the Voter's Choice Act in 2023, which changed precinct-specific polling places to regional vote centers. **You can now vote at any vote center location in the county.**



Want an even *faster* voting experience? Bring your vote-by-mail ballot to **any vote center** during the in-person voting period (May 23 – June 2), put it in the scanner and watch it counted in front of you! All ballots cast in person will be included in Election Night results. Just **Sign, Scan & Go!**

When Are Vote Centers Open?

Placer County will have 30 vote centers for the June 2, 2026 Statewide Direct Primary Election. Each vote center is either a 4-day or 11-day location, open according to the calendar shown below. The hours of operation for all vote centers will be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. every day except Election Day, when hours will be 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Why the Change?

Placer County adopted the Voter's Choice Act for two main reasons:

- ★ Voters have more choice and control over where and when they vote. Vote centers enable in-person voting at any location for multiple days.
- ★ With fewer vote centers, it's easier to find enough locations and staff. Having fewer machines and ballot collection points also strengthens election integrity and support from permanent elections staff.

Other Requirements

Voter's Choice Act counties must provide one ballot drop box for every 15,000 registered voters. With 29 drop boxes and approximately 300,000 voters, Placer County is well above this minimum.

Counties must also hold regular community advisory meetings with disability and language community groups. Placer County's advisory committees meet quarterly. You can attend meetings online or in person at the Elections Office at 3715 Atherton Road in Rocklin. 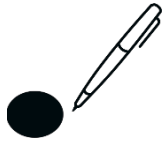

HOW TO FILL OUT YOUR BALLOT

You may use the **sample ballot** in this guide as a reference when filling out your official ballot.



Mark your ballot with a **blue or black pen**. Do *not* use a pencil.

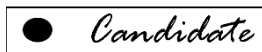


Completely fill in the oval next to your selections. Do *not* use an **X** mark, **✓** mark, outline or partial shading.



Look at both sides of the ballot. There may be contests on the back. You don't have to vote in every contest.

WRITE-IN



To vote for a write-in candidate, print that candidate's name on the blank WRITE-IN line and completely fill in the nearby oval. Only votes for qualified write-in candidates will count; a list will be posted ten days before Election Day on **May 23, 2026** at www.placercountyelections.gov/current-elections. Don't write in a candidate already on the ballot for that contest.



If you choose to return your ballot by mail or drop box, place your ballot in the return envelope once you are done voting. **Sign and date** the back of the envelope next to the red **X**. You can also cast your vote-by-mail ballot using a ballot scanner at any vote center location and see it counted as you watch - just **Sign, Scan & Go!**

Did you lose, damage or never receive your ballot? You can:



- ★ Request a **mailed** replacement ballot by phone, email or paper application no later than **May 26**.
- ★ Vote in person at any Placer County vote center or the Elections Office.
- ★ Get a ballot to go at any Placer County vote center or the Elections Office.

Want to change a selection on your ballot?

The best option is to get a replacement ballot. However, if you don't have time to get a new ballot, you can completely line out the incorrect choice, write NO in the space to the right, then fill in the oval of your new choice and write YES beside it. If you change a ballot selection in a different way, your intent may be unclear.

Do not write personal identifiers (initials, name, signature) on the ballot itself. When ballots contain identifying information, state law requires the Elections Office to duplicate the ballot to make it unidentifiable, which takes time, costs taxpayer money and raises questions about election integrity.

VOTING IN PERSON

With the Voter's Choice Act, you do not have an assigned polling place and may **vote in person at any Placer County vote center**. The in-person voting period starts at select vote centers on May 23, 2026.

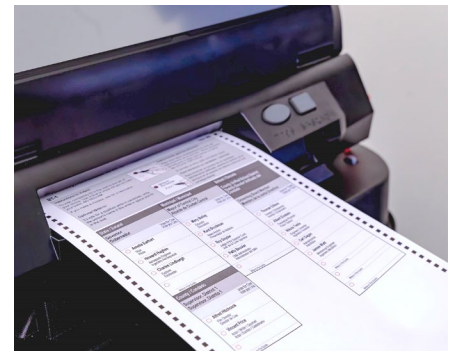
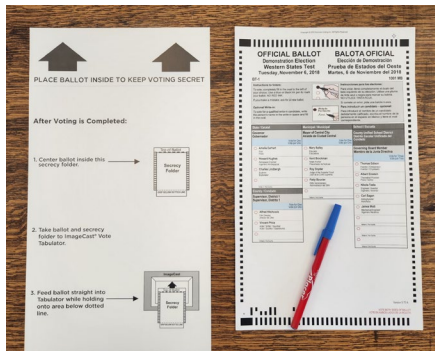
Vote-by-mail voting begins at the Placer County Elections Office (3715 Atherton Road, Rocklin, CA 95765) on May 4.

In 2024 and 2025, Placer County had the highest in-person voting percentage in California! Voting in person is a fantastic way to engage with your community and ensure your votes are included in Election Night results.

What To Expect at a Vote Center

A vote center officer will ask for your name, address and signature, then issue you a ballot if you did not bring your vote-by-mail ballot with you. When you are done voting, cast your ballot using the ballot scanner.



1. Sign the roster to receive a ballot.

Take a pen and voter guide if you need them. Vote centers listed on the LNG1 page have translated sample ballots.

2. Vote your ballot at a voting booth or ballot marking device.

Make sure to completely fill in the ovals and check both sides of the ballot. Print your ballot if using a ballot marking device.

3. Cast your ballot using the ballot scanner.

Hold your ballot and feed it through the scanner. You will hear a bell, and the number of ballots counted will increase by one.



Voting in Person Is Now Easier *and* Faster!

Speed up the voting process by bringing your vote-by-mail ballot to a vote center for counting. Simply **sign** the roster at the check-in table, **scan** your ballot using the ballot scanner and **go!**

Previously, voters were limited to dropping off their vote-by-mail ballots for later processing at the Elections Office. This is still an option, but there are many advantages to scanning your ballot during your visit.

- ★ It is exciting to see your ballot counted in real time as you watch, especially knowing your votes will be included in Election Night results.
- ★ We will not have to contact you later about a missing or nonmatching signature on your ballot envelope.
- ★ **Sign, Scan & Go** – it's that easy!

Placer County supports **English, Spanish, Tagalog** and **Punjabi** speakers. The table below shows which vote centers support your preferred language for **in-person voting**. We make every effort to have a fluent speaker available at these locations. A translated sample ballot may also be available for you to refer to when voting.



You may vote at any vote center. If no fluent speaker is available, an election official can call a LanguageLine translator. You also may bring up to two people to help you with voting, as long as they are not agents of your employer or union.



El Condado de Placer admite hablantes de **inglés, español, tagalo y punjabi**. La siguiente tabla muestra qué centros de votación admiten su idioma preferido para la **votación en persona**. VOTING ACCESSIBILITY



Placer County ensures voters with accessibility needs can vote independently and privately. Elections staff have surveyed every vote center and ballot drop box, addressing any access barriers to meet Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility standards.



Ballot marking device: Use this device to mark and print a ballot at a vote center. It can read the ballot aloud and is compatible with audio tactile interface (ATI), sip-and-puff and paddles.

Accessibility tools: Ask for a magnifying device, signature guide card or attachable pen grip at the check-in table.

Curbside voting: From your vehicle, press the blue drive-up button outside the vote center or call the number on the sign to alert a vote center officer to bring out voting materials, including a ballot marking device.



Accessible voter guide and sample ballot: Get an online version of your voter information guide and sample ballot that is compatible with screen readers at sbvg.uocava.com/placer. An audio version of the Placer County Voter Information Guide is available upon request by phone or email.



Remote Accessible Vote by Mail (RAVBM)

RAVBM lets you access and mark your ballot online using a system compatible with screen readers and assistive devices. Any voter may request to use RAVBM from May 4 until 8 p.m. on Election Day, June 2, 2026.

You must print your RAVBM ballot. There is no web connection while logged into the system, ensuring your selections are private and secure. The California Secretary of State has tested and certified this RAVBM system.

To use RAVBM, you will need internet access, a printer and an envelope.

You will receive an email with your access code and a link to the RAVBM website. Enter your access code and date of birth to log in.

After you make and review your selections, your ballot packet will download automatically. Print your ballot from the file. Put the ballot in your vote-by-mail return envelope if you have it. Otherwise, print the return envelope wraparound image and attach it to your own envelope. **Sign and date** the back of the envelope next to the red **X**.

Return your RAVBM ballot at a vote center, drop box or by mail. Ballots returned by mail must be postmarked on or before Election Day and received by the Elections Office no later than June 9.

TOP TWO CANDIDATES OPEN PRIMARY ACT

Elections in California

The Top Two Candidates Open Primary Act requires that all candidates for a voter-nominated office be listed on the same ballot. Previously known as partisan offices, voter-nominated offices include state legislative offices, U.S. congressional offices and state constitutional offices.

In both open primary and general elections, you can vote for any candidate regardless of what party preference you indicated on your voter registration form. In the primary election, the two candidates receiving the most votes—regardless of party preference—move on to the general election. If a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent +1), a general election still must be held.

California's open primary system does not apply to candidates running for U.S. President, county central committee or local offices.

Write-in candidates for voter-nominated offices may still run in the primary election. However, a write-in candidate may only move on to the general election if the candidate is one of the top two vote-getters in the primary election. Additionally, there is no independent nomination process for a general election.

California law requires the following information to be printed in this guide:

Voter-Nominated Offices

Political parties are not entitled to formally nominate candidates for voter-nominated offices at the primary election. A candidate nominated for a voter-nominated office at the primary election is the nominee of the people and not the official nominee of any party at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a voter-nominated office shall have his or her qualified party preference, or lack of qualified party preference, stated on the ballot, but the party preference designation is selected solely by the candidate and is shown for the information of the voters only. It does not mean the candidate is nominated or endorsed by the party designated, or that there is an affiliation between the party and candidate, and no candidate nominated by the voters shall be deemed to be the officially nominated candidate of any political party. In the county voter information guide, parties may list the candidates for voter-nominated offices who have received the party's official endorsement.

Any voter may vote for any candidate for a voter-nominated office if they meet the other qualifications

required to vote for that office. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the voter-nominated office, even if both candidates have specified the same party preference designation. No party is entitled to have a candidate with its party preference designation move on to the general election unless the candidate is one of the two highest vote-getters at the primary election.

Nonpartisan Offices

Political parties are not entitled to nominate candidates for nonpartisan offices at the primary election, and a candidate at the primary election is not the official nominee of any party for the specific office at the general election. A candidate for nomination to a nonpartisan office may not designate his or her party preference, or lack of party preference, on the ballot. The top two vote-getters at the primary election move on to the general election for the nonpartisan office.

County Nonpartisan Offices

For county nonpartisan offices at the primary election, if a candidate receives a majority of the vote (at least 50 percent + 1), then that candidate will be elected to the position and that race will not continue onto the general election ballot in November.





POLITICAL PARTY ENDORSEMENTS

Pursuant to Elections Code Section 13302(b), a qualified political party may submit to the county elections official a list of all candidates for voter-nominated office who will appear on a ballot in the county in question, and who have been endorsed by the party by whatever lawful mechanism the party adopts for endorsing candidates for voter-nominated office. Furthermore, the county elections official shall print the names of the candidates for voter-nominated office who were endorsed by that political party in the voter information portion of the county voter information guide.

- ★ Endorsements and candidate names are printed *exactly as submitted* by the political party.

Reminders

- ★ **Sign and date** the back of your ballot envelope next to the red **X**. If your signature is missing or does not match your voter record signature(s), your ballot will not be counted until you correct the issue with our office.
- ★ **Use Sign, Scan & Go!** to cast your vote-by-mail ballot using a ballot scanner at a vote center and have it counted while you watch!
- ★ **Picking up another voter's replacement ballot?** You'll need their written authorization. To drop off another voter's ballot, you must print and sign your name in the authorization section of their return envelope.
- ★ **Moving after May 18?** If you move *within* Placer County after this date, you can vote with your registered residence address or conditionally register to vote at your new address. You cannot vote twice.

How To Return Your Voted Ballot

By Mail



Return your ballot postage-free through the United States Postal Service anytime until Election Day. Your ballot must be postmarked on or before Election Day (June 2) and received by June 9 to be counted, so we recommend voting early. Vote-by-mail ballots received early will be part of Election Night results!

At a Drop Box Starting May 5



Placer County provides secure, official ballot drop boxes from May 5 until 8 p.m. on Election Day, June 2. Most boxes are available 24 hours a day. Locations have changed since the last election. See the DROP page inside for locations and times.

At a Vote Center Starting May 23



Polling places are no longer assigned. Visit any Placer County vote center to vote in person or have your vote-by-mail ballot counted in front of you! Curbside voting and ballot marking devices compatible with accessibility equipment are available at all vote center locations. 11-day vote centers open May 23; 4-day centers open May 30. Locations have changed since the last election. See the VOTE page inside for locations and times.
